

The importance of family and parental relationships

Pillar One: Love

Children live in stable, loving homes and have strong relationships with trusted adults



Why it's important

- A sense of safety, belonging and security
- More likely to have better physical & mental health & academic performance
- Improved long-term development

- Every child in a home where they feel loved, close to friends, family & school
- The right help at the right time for all children & families
- Advocacy & stability for children in care
- Reward & recognition for those working with children

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Pillar Two: Fun

Children have access to leisure facilities, outdoor space and places to play with their friends



Why it's important

- Building skills, knowledge and risk awareness
- Healthy lifestyles
- Social skills
- Self-identify and protection against isolation





Where we want to be

- Safe, easily accessible spaces for children & their friends
- Access to nature
- Digital accessibility
- Easily accessible informal support
- Planning & urban design that enhances health & wellbeing

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Pillar Three: A chance to learn and grow

Children have opportunities for formal and informal learning that meets their needs



Why it's important

- Improved long-term outcomes
- Independence
- Confidence and selfesteem
- Social mobility
- Improved mental health





Where we want to be

- Good home learning environments
- High quality, affordable early education & childcare
- Inclusive schools
- Cultural activities for all children
- Tailored careers advice
- Local skills partnerships

Pillar Four: Safety

Children are safe in their homes and neighbourhoods



Why it's important

- Improved long-term relationships, education, behaviour & health
- Independence
- Psychological safety helps children to learn





Where we want to be

- Children are protected from harm wherever they are, including from risks facilitated by technology
- Training for those working with children
- Swift access to support for children
- A child-first approach to youth justice

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Pillar Five: Health

Children live in good homes, with access to healthy food and appropriate health services



Why it's important

- Good health lays the foundation for physical, intellectual and emotional development
- Resilience and ability to take advantage of opportunities
- Improved long-term outcomes





Where we want to be

- No child living in poverty
- Ensuring protective factors in place for good mental and physical health and wellbeing
- A good quality home for every child
- Children receive health care they need, with focus on prevention
- Action on climate change

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Overarching recommendations

A cross-government strategy for children

Sufficient and sustainable funding

A children's workforce plan

Families are supported to thrive with high-quality local services

Councils are coleaders of local education systems

Stable, high-quality homes for all children

Education nurtures children and prepares them for independence Councils have the ingredients they need to create great places to grow up

A clear plan for the most vulnerable children

Timely access to high quality healthcare, including mental healthcare

Partners work together towards shared outcomes

Discrimination is tackled across every service and at the highest level
